The February meeting will feature Mark Barr.

Mark will recap briefly what his seminar included plus more. Mark uses his router skill as a primary method for building and jointing the furniture he builds. He will show how using his router with shop built jigs makes the router a special tool for woodworking.

Mark Barr

About 25 years ago was the first time Mark Barr came to Greenville to conduct a seminar for members of the Woodworkers Guild. At that time he said there were 28 members, a couple of names he still recalls, and they are still very active in the Guild. Over the past 25 years Mark has been here ten to twelve more times conducting other seminars and we are lucky enough to not only have him as presenter at our next meeting but to also have him conduct a seminar on Monday before our meeting.

A custom furniture builder for 30 years, Mark spends his time in his two on property shops creating home and office furniture. From 20 foot conference tables, entertainment centers, dining tables, and curved reception desks, his business is about 50% office and 50% home furnishings.

Mark is into efficiency – using some hand tools but also using power tools to get the job done. His philosophy is to keep it simple – break down the piece into smaller projects. He builds many of his own jigs and fixtures to accomplish that.

Teaching is also a part of woodworking Mark enjoys. Along with teaching throughout the country, one of his shops is set up to use for teaching. And now that his children are grown he plans to do more teaching from home.

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

Youth Activities

Thanks to ten of our GWG members for giving up a Sunday afternoon and helping a group of Cub Scouts, ages 7-11, with a special project. Each year Cub Scouts and their Dads make a small “Pinewood Derby” car, and have races against each other on a special track. The cars come as kits with a basic block of wood, and we help them cut it out to their own design with our bandsaws and sanders. This project dates back to our old shop, and we have assisted hundreds of young boys, hopefully encouraging them to become future woodworkers.

What's new in the shop?

Thanks to some dealing and an anonymous donor, we have a new Powermatic 22 inch drum sander to add to our sanding equipment. The old Jet drum sander will be relocated, and have 80 grit paper for general sanding. The new Powermatic will have 100 or 120 grit paper, and be used for finish sanding. All users will have to be certified on this machine, and will have to schedule use with a supervisor, and leave collateral while using it. Almost all problems that we have encountered with all sanding machines has been from glue-ups and too aggressive (thickness) passes. Problems from glue have been uncured glue, excess glue, and improperly cleaned glue joints. In the future, all members are asked to wait 24 hours before using sanding machines after a glue-up. This will allow the glue to thoroughly dry and not melt from the friction and heat of the sanding machine. We have recently seen brand new belts ruined in five minutes from glue. Belts for the new machine cost \$10 each, and members that damage a belt will be asked to pay for it; therefore the supervisor will check the Powermatic sanding belt before and after each use. Certification classes are being scheduled through our member website www.gwgmembers.com. If we learn how to properly use this machine, it will serve our needs for many years.
