

Until we meet on January 9, 2023 for our next Membership Meeting, I wish you all a Happy, Healthy, and Prosperous New Year!




The Hartness Award

Volunteers Needed for the Tool Sale Program

The semi-annual Tool Sales are one of the most important funding programs for the Greenville Woodworkers Guild. The tools are available for sale to both Guild and non-Guild members. The most recent sale raised more than \$10,000 in charitable donations.

Like all Guild programs, the sales are coordinated and staffed entirely by Guild members. Volunteers collect tools from those in the community who wish to liquidate their shop tools and equipment. The tools are offered as either a donation or on consignment. The most recent sale included items from 30 sellers/donors. Guild volunteers pick up, sort, organize, price, and conduct the sales.

The Tool Program Team needs your help to increase charitable donations, specifically to:

- Increase the number of Guild members who volunteer to collect and prepare items for the sales.
- Increase the number of tool sellers/donors.
- Broaden the market outside of the greater
 Greenville area to increase the number of people who attend the Tool Sales.

The results of the 2022 Toy Program are truly incredible! Again this year, our members made enough toys for the 14 organizations the Guild continues to support. The team produced over 1,400 toys and invested over 3,500 hours of their time. The variety and quality of the toys produced are amazing. Our volunteers' dedication to providing toys for children is an inspiration to us all.

The Toy Program usually runs from April through November of each year. The Guild "elves" meet at the shop every Tuesday morning to decide what toys to make, design prototypes for review, and build jigs for use in the building process. Our volunteers then build the toys that children will receive during the holidays. In addition to the Tuesday morning volunteers, there are also members who support the

program using their personal shops. And a very big "Thank You" again goes out to the folks at the Simpsonville Senior Center, who added their artistic painting touches to finish some of the toys.

Now that the Guild "elves" work is done and the toys have been delivered, it's time for the children to enjoy these treasured gifts - not only during the holidays, but for years to come.























































